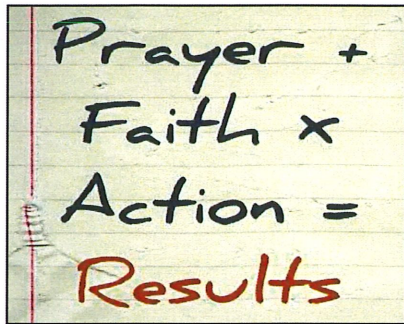

GARDENING MINISTRY

Presbytera Ann Routsos and Tanya Bang are starting a gardening ministry. Are you interested in getting involved in a hands-on gardening project or donating a perennial plant?

Some of the existing perennial plants in the flower beds around the church need to be split up and replanted for them to grow to their full and best potential. We would also like to plant additional perennial plants. We invite everyone to participate or contribute, in any of these ways:

1. Be part of the "hands-on" gardening crew and help with weeding or planting in the flower beds. All ages welcome, if under 8 years old with parental supervision.
2. Contribute a perennial plant from their home garden to be planted at the church by a gardening team member.
3. Purchase a perennial plant for the gardening team to plant on their behalf.
4. Donate money to purchase plants or fertilizer.

Donations of plants need to be at St. Georges by June 23. Leave donations beside, not blocking, the basement door of the church (side entrance). Monetary donations marked specifically for the gardening ministry given to a Board Member at the candle table, in the Narthex.

To a very great extent we are unreal and God so often in our relationship is unreal to us because we believe that we turn to God, when we are in fact turning to something we imagine to be God; and we think that we are standing before him in all truth, whereas we are putting forward someone who is not our real self, who is an actor, a sham, a stage personality."* Living Prayer pg.113

We hear in the Epistle reading for the Feast of Prophet Elijah on July 20, **"The prayer of a righteous man has great power in its effects"** – and later we hear how St James mentions the Prophet Elijah (Elias) please more about this great man of God, in another reflection of this newsletter.

Prayer involves more than just kneeling at a bed with hands folded and eyes closed. It goes beyond just sitting on a rock while hiking with our arms outstretched and head lifted up. While these are both great postures for prayer, other things need to be done. Prayer involves effort and faith.

When we say "Amen" following our prayers, this doesn't mean that our prayer is over... it means that your action now needs to begin!

REFLECTION:

Do you sometimes question if God is hearing your prayers? Why?

Have you ever wondered if God might use you to accomplish the result of what you are praying for?

When you pray for loved ones (family, friends, etc) do you follow this prayer with something tangible to show your love for those whom you have prayed for?

If you pray for those who are sick or suffering – do you do something to help them?

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Recently I attended the funeral service of a long-time member of our community. She was known and loved by all. She had a way of making everybody she encountered feel special, just by saying hello and by her warm and affectionate smile. We often feel a void when a community member passes. Some voids are felt more deeply than others. Nevertheless, life and time march on, and we are left with memories of the departed.

As Fr. Demetri was finishing his comments at the end of the service, Fr. Ted Barbas offered a few words. He spoke about how we choose to remember those "who have fallen asleep in the Lord," and briefly touched upon how we would choose to be remembered. Those words really resounded in me, "How we choose to be remembered."

Think about that for a minute. How would you choose to be remembered? It is a harder question to answer than you would think. It is easy to say, "I want to be remembered with love and affection." But does that get to the heart of the question? There are so many ways that we can be remembered. Our family may remember us one way, our co-workers another, our friends still another. When we tell our favorite stories about people who have passed, when we recount the laughs that were shared, or the tears that were shed, or the embarrassing moments that make up life; we are keeping their memory alive. "May their memory be eternal..." just like the hymn we sing. When we think of our friends or relatives who have passed, we keep them "alive." It is when we stop thinking of them, then they are truly gone. But those stories do not answer the question of how **we choose** to be remembered.

There is a phrase that I believe encompasses the way that all of us would choose to be remembered. We have heard it so many times in church that I am embarrassed to admit that I had never really given it much thought until today. To be described as a "good and faithful servant of God" eclipses anything that anyone can say when describing or remembering us. To be a "good and faithful servant" is to "do" without fanfare or expecting accolades. Being a "good and faithful servant" extends beyond doing for the church. It includes being there for family, friends, and community. That having been said, on behalf of the Board of Directors and our community I would like to thank the Ladies of the Anagennesis for their stalwart efforts for the countless Coffee Hours this year. The entire St. George Community appreciates your efforts on our behalf. To the many volunteers coordinated by the Anagennesis, we thank you for the pre-

GLENDI preparations of the delicacies that we will enjoy at our festival! Once again you have all answered the call! Thank you!

HOLY PROPHET ELIJAH (ELIAS) AS A MODEL FOR OUR LIVES



Prophet Elias or Elijah (Feast Day - July 20)

Elijah the Prophet lived around 816 B.C. and prophesied for twenty-five years. He came from the tribe of Aaron and from the city of Tishbi, which God gave to the Priests. Through prayer he did many miracles, and he was a zealot. When Christ was transfigured on Mount Tabor, he was present with Moses. "And behold, two men conversed with Him, appearing in glory and speaking of His departure, which was about to take place in Jerusalem" (Lk. 9:30-31).

The Prophet Elijah was a zealot and fiery. He had zeal for God "with knowledge", because there is a zeal without knowledge, which creates great problems in the Body of the Church and in society in general. True zeal is that which is associated with the spiritual life and the inner struggle a person makes to be purified of the passions, to meet God and acquire communion with Him. This teaching is clearly seen in Patristic texts and in Orthodox hymnology. In the First Kathisma of the Liti for the Vespers of the Prophet Elijah we chant: "Elijah the zealot and emperor over your passions ... you were an angel in the flesh and a fleshless man who showed us accomplishments in virtue." A true zealot is he who rules his passions and not one who is ruled or carried by them. He who with his spiritual accomplishments has become an equal of holy angels and, though he lives on earth, his citizenship is in heaven.

He is an angel with flesh and a man without flesh, that is, without a carnal mind. In his epistle to the Corinthians the Apostle Paul explains to us what a carnal mind is: "For you are yet carnal. As long as there is among you jealousy, and strife, and divisions, are you not carnal, and walk as men?" (1 Cor. 3:3). Jealousy, discord, anger and quarrels cannot have a relationship with God, because God is love, He is the God of peace. The Prophet Elijah, living in the time and spirit of the Old Testament, killed, as is known, the "priests of shame", but God gave him to understand that he was wrong with the example of the strong wind, the earthquake, the fire and the still small voice, saying that God is not found in the strong wind, the earthquake or the fire, but "in the still small voice", in other words, God does not love violence, but tranquility, peace and gentleness (1 Kings 19:11-12).

Fanaticism can have no relationship with Orthodox Christians, nor with true zeal for God. Fanaticism prevails in religions and organizations with an anthropocentric character, creating a climate of fanaticism and polarization to create and retain followers. Orthodoxy is not a religion, in the sense of an anthropocentric religion, but the Church. It is the revelation of God and not a human discovery. It does not have followers, but members who are "baptized and have certain faith", who have been baptized in the Name of the Holy Trinity and they live or they struggle to live in accordance with the will of God.

The mass apostasy from God, as seen in our days, as well as the presence of many heresies, often makes us lose hope and we see all as black, with the result that we are led towards erroneous conclusions. One of these errors is the belief that saints do not exist today, but this is not true. In every era there are people of God, even in our days. There are always true worshippers, who live by prayer, selfless love and sacrifice. When the Prophet Elijah lost hope seeing the people run behind the false god Baal and he thought he was the only one on earth who worshipped God as a Prophet of the true God, God revealed to him that there were seven thousand men who had not worshipped Baal, but they remained faithful to the God of their fathers. Therefore, we always need to be calm and have absolute trust in God.

True zealots are those who combine, as the Prophet Elijah did, zeal and love towards God with prayer and the hesychastic life. Those who shun extremes are they who experienced the humility of Christ, gentleness and inner peace. Those who really and truly feel the presence of God do so "in a still small voice".

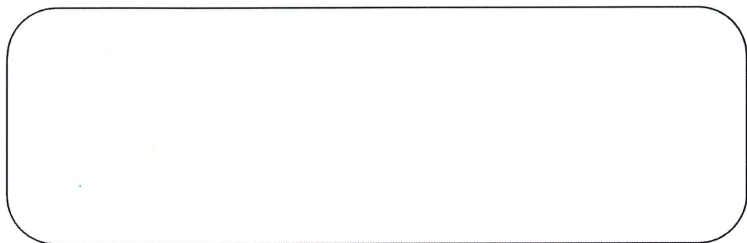
